Intent

At Beccles Primary School, personal, social, health and economic (PSHE) education enables our children to become healthy, independent and responsible members of a society. It aims to help them understand how they are developing personally and socially, and tackles many of the moral, social and cultural issues that are part of growing up. We provide our children with opportunities for them to learn about rights and responsibilities and appreciate what it means to be a member of a diverse society.

Our PSHE curriculum develops learning and results in the acquisition of knowledge and skills which enables children to access the wider curriculum and to prepare children to be a global citizen now and in their future roles within a global community.

Implementation

The teaching and implementation of the PSHE and Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) Curriculum at Beccles Primary Academy is based on the National Curriculum and the Jigsaw PSHE programme.

As part of the PSHE and RSHE curriculum, pupils experience the following units of learning annually and at a age appropriate level: being me in my world, celebrating difference, dreams and goals, healthy me, relationships, and changing me.

The lessons are taught in classes and the same lesson structure is followed from Reception to Year 6. This ensures consistency and allows the students to fully commit to the focus of the lesson. The Jigsaw programme allows for time to reflect on the topic and gives the students the tools to be mindful, a useful life skill to support resilience.

During each area of study, the students learn new vocabulary and apply this to the unit of learning, consider and question the world around them, hone their skills in forming viewpoints in debate, listen to other pupils' viewpoints and respond accordingly.

Impact

By the time children leave Beccles Primary Academy they should be able to:

- To have a good understanding of how to stay safe, healthy and develop good relationships.
- To have an appreciation of what it means to be a positive member of a diverse, multicultural society.
- To have a strong self awareness and form self resilience interlinked with compassion of others.

We measure the effectiveness and impact of our PSHE Curriculum in a variety of ways:

- Summative assessment termly assessments take place to track pupils' progress against age-related expectations for art.
- Leaders' monitoring lesson observations; learning walks; book scrutiny, pupil voice.
- Children in Foundation Stage are assessed within the Early Years Framework and their progress tracked using Tapestry observations.
- Formative assessment -assessment for learning takes place daily and is used to identify individual needs and to inform future planning.
